[9] The rental vacancy rate is the proportion of the rental inventory that is vacant "for rent." It is computed by dividing the total number of vacant units "for rent." by the sum of the renteroccupied units, vacant units that are "for rent," and vacant units that have been rented but not yet occupied; and then multiplying by 100.
