The Beasts and The Children

In the aftermath of 9-11, we initially emphasized the necessity of a dialogue with our children about terrorism in America. Citizens' Attitudes Toward Crime and Justice: Results of the 2001 Penn State Poll

The Penn State Poll is an annual survey of Pennsylvanians, 18 years of age and older, conducted by the Center for Survey Research at Penn State Harrisburg. The purpose of this lecture is to describe the purpose and methodology of the Penn State Poll and to present some of the key findings of the 2001 Poll, such as Pennsylvanians' attitudes toward: (1) the death penalty; (2) the purpose of punishment; (3) separate justice systems for special populations; and (4) government's military action in Afghanistan.

Dr. Sims received her Ph.D. in Criminal Justice at Sam Houston State University. A devoted author, reviewer, researcher and lecturer of criminology and related studies, Dr. Sims is currently Assistant Professor of Criminal Justice for Penn State Harrisburg's School of Public Affairs.
