The Commonwealth's Official Source for Population and Economic Statistics

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First ACS County-to-County Migration Data Shows Pennsylvania Gained More than 16,000 Residents

PENN STATE HARRISBURG – The U.S. Census Bureau recently released the 2005-2009 American Community Survey (ACS) County-to-County Migration Flows. The data, which documents migratory patterns of the population during the period 2005-2009, marks the first set of county-to-county migration flow data to be generated from the ACS and is the first data set addressing this topic since the 2000 Census. Data released in the file shows the total number of movers between pairs of counties in the United States.

According to the data, the number of people moving into Pennsylvania from another state during the period 2005-2009 was 248,783 while the number of people moving out of the Commonwealth to another state was 232,331. During the time period, the net migration (in-migrants minus out-migrants) was 16,452. Overall, the Commonwealth gained 1.3 people per 1,000 residents over the time period 2005-2009. New Pennsylvania residents were most likely to come from counties in neighboring states (see Table 1.). Counties in neighboring states were also the most popular destination for former Pennsylvania residents with counties in Delaware, New York and New Jersey ranking in the top overall; however, counties from states in the Western United States (Arizona and California) ranked fourth and fifth, respectively (see Table 2.)

During the period 2005-2009, more than 1.2 million people lived in a different house within Pennsylvania one year earlier. Of these movers, 344,042 lived in a different county. Table 3. shows the Pennsylvania counties with the largest number of in-migrants along with the county from which the largest number of migrants originated.

More about County-to-County Migration Data

The 2005-2009 American Community Survey County-to-County Migration Files provide tables for each county in the nation, showing both inflows and outflows. Inflows are the number of people living in a given county who lived in another specific county one year earlier, while outflows represent the number of people who lived in a particular county one year earlier who subsequently moved to another specific county.

Caution must be exercised by data users when comparing data from today's release with similar data was published from Census 2000 SF-3. County-to-county migration data from Census 2000 SF-3 was produced for the number of migrants who moved between counties in the United States in the previous 5 years as opposed to the "1 year ago" time frame used by the 2005-2009 American Community Survey.

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Later this year, the U.S. Census Bureau plans to release a file from the 2006-2010 American Community Survey five-year estimates showing county-to-county flows by demographic characteristics, such as age, sex, and race and Hispanic origin.
