



2017 County Population Estimates:

Slower Growth than Last Decade

HARRISBURG - Pennsylvania's southeast and southcentral counties continue to grow into the second half of the decade while the rest of the state experiences population losses. Despite ranking 6th in the nation for total population, percent decreases at the county level have resulted in more than two-thirds of Pennsylvania's counties ranking in the bottom 50% in terms of growth.

The county-level population estimates show the estimated population for all counties in the United States. The estimates are calculated using administrative records to estimate components of population change such as births, deaths, and migration. The estimates reflect changes to the 2010 Census population resulting from legal boundary updates as of January 1st of the vintage year and Count Question Resolution (CQR) actions.

Population Growth in Pennsylvania

Philadelphia County, the Commonwealth's most populous county, reported the largest growth numerically at 54,857 persons since 2010, and also experienced the largest increase from 2016 to 2017 (+6,098 persons). Montgomery (+26,145), Lancaster (+23,456), Chester (+20,118), and Lehigh (+16,821) followed Philadelphia as the highest grossing counties numerically since 2010.

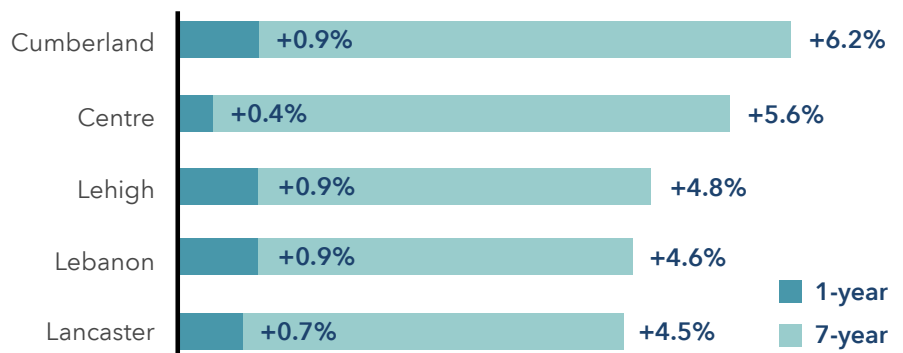
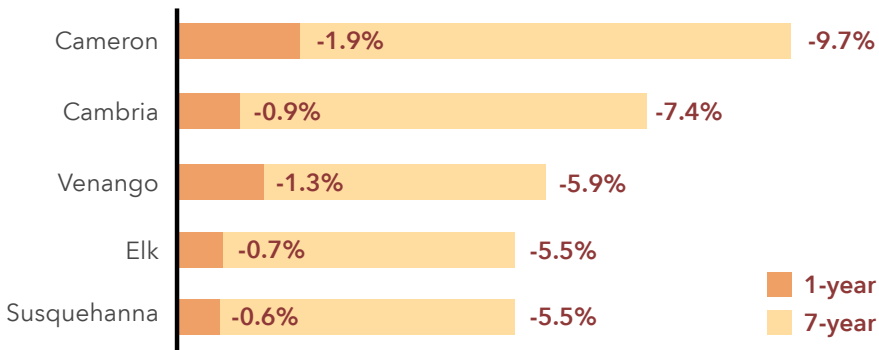


Figure 1. Seven-year (2010-2017) and one-year (2016-2017) growth for five counties with the highest percent gains since 2010.

Cumberland County remained the fastest growing county since 2010 and tied with Lebanon and Lehigh counties for the highest percent gain from 2016 to 2017 (+0.9 percent). Centre, Lehigh, Lebanon, and Lancaster rounded out the top 5 counties that experienced a percent gain since 2010 while also boasting modest increases since the previous estimates year [Figure 1].

Population Decline in Pennsylvania

Pennsylvania experienced population decreases in 47 counties since 2010, and 39 counties decreased in population between 2016 and 2017. Westmoreland (-12,537), Cambria (-10,620), Erie (-6,023), Schuylkill (-5,720), and Fayette (-5,098), had the highest decreases since 2010 while Allegheny County, the state's second-most populous county, experienced the highest numeric decrease from 2016 to 2017 (-4,505 persons).



Cameron County retained the largest loss in percent change this decade and tied with Union County for the largest percent lost from 2016 to 2017 (-1.9 percent). Cambria, Venango, Elk, and Susquehanna Counties along with Cameron constituted the five highest counties in percent loss since 2010 [Figure 2].

Figure 2. Seven-year (2010-2017) and one-year (2016-2017) growth for five counties with the highest percent loss since 2010.

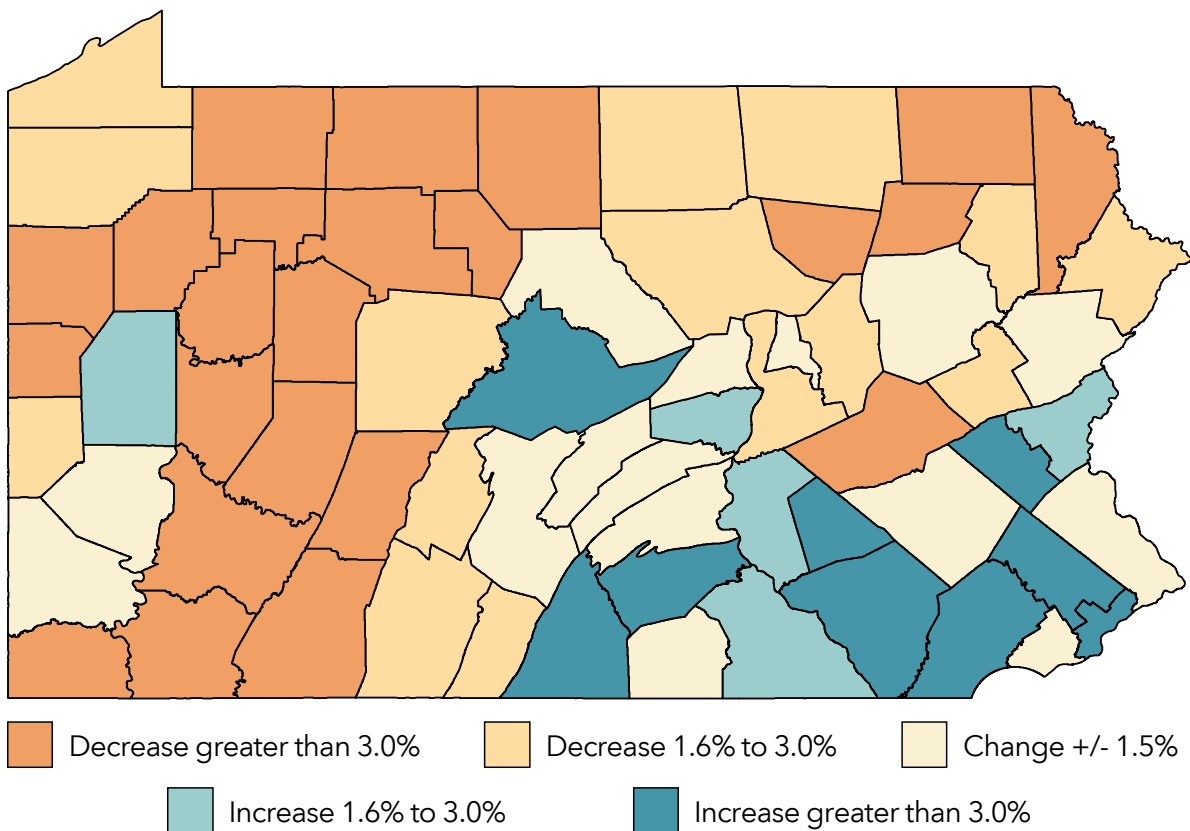


Figure 3. Percent population change in counties of PA, 2010-2017.

National Context for Population Change

For percent change from 2010 to 2017, two-thirds (45) of Pennsylvania's 67 counties ranked in the bottom half of U.S. while almost a third (21) fell in the bottom quartile. Fewer counties ranked in the bottom half (41) while more ranked in the bottom quartile (34) for percent change from 2016 to 2017.

Births, Deaths, and Migration in the Commonwealth

There were an estimated 1,025,691 births in Pennsylvania since 2010 with 138,818 of those occurring in 2017. A total of 935,944 deaths occurred since 2010 resulting in a natural increase of 89,747 persons. In 2017, 131,458 deaths resulted in a natural increase of 7,360 for the state. International migration continues to make up for the state's outmigration of domestic residents with a net migration of 20,444 for the seven-year period. The state experienced a large net gain in 2017 (+11,596 persons) following net losses in 2014 through 2016.

From 2010 to 2017, Philadelphia (+58,940), Lancaster (+17,009), and Chester (+12,265) had the highest natural increases in the state while Westmoreland (-9,208), Luzerne (-5,952), and Schuylkill (-4,042) had the most natural losses. The largest net migration occurred in the Montgomery (+15,726), Cumberland (+12,234), and Lehigh (+11,013) with largest losses in Erie (-8,511), Cambria (-7,070) and Indiana (-3,481).

From 2016 to 2017, Philadelphia (+6,750), Lancaster (+2,198), and Chester (+1,366) had the highest natural increases while Westmoreland (-1,368), Luzerne (-855), and Washington (-556) experienced the most natural loss. Net migration was highest in Montgomery (+4,465), Lehigh (+2,537) and Cumberland (+1,811), and negative net migration was seen in Allegheny (-3,940), Erie (-2,066) and Union (-842).

Population Estimates Resources

Today's release is the seventh county-level population estimates release from the U.S. Census Bureau's Population Estimates Division this decade. Population estimates for the total population are provided for every county in the United States. Total populations for sub-county areas (municipalities) and housing unit estimates for state and counties will be released in May. County-level age, sex, race and ethnicity estimates will be available in June.
